The HOTR Experience: One resident's story

For 61 years, Home On The Range has been helping children change their lives and be successful. While the children are at Home On The Range, they are given many opportunities to learn from mistakes they might make, or make positive changes.

The kids are involved in school, work programs, recreational activities, spiritual programs or in therapeutic groups. The children's achievements can be small or large, or happen right away or take some time.

“Jason” has been at Home On The Range for some time. He's had a tough and difficult life, and often his family hasn't been involved in his life or been there to support him in his treatment. Jason had his ups and downs here as well.

He was then recommended to participate in the equine assisted therapy program. We saw improvements in his behavior, he stayed in school full-time and is getting good grades, he controls his anger when he gets upset, and is even starting to be a dorm role model. This is his story in his words.

“The equine program has helped me because it has taught me to be patient, to finish strong, anger control and to be aware of my surroundings. The equine group has tenets. There are six tenets: responsibility, humility, finish strong, others before yourself, be aware of your surroundings, and dignity. These tenets tie into group and real life experiences. These tenets teach us in the group to be aware of the horse and on the outs people around us, to help others in need, to put others on the same level as yourself, to look at what you are doing, to say you were the one who did it, and to always finish what you are doing and never give up. Equine holds its group members to a higher expectation than others, so that the group learns the rules and not only that but to also go above the rules. The most important thing I learned in equine is to not blow up, or anger control. This is not one of our tenets but when you are with horses you cannot get angry. Because you aren't thinking clearly you can get into an accident easily and also horses are kind of like mirrors. They pick up your vibe and copy your mood so when you are angry you're more likely to get hurt.”

It took some time, but Jason is a better person, making better choices, and being successful in the equine group.

2011 HOTR Champions Ride Rodeo



For the first time in many years, the Champions Ride Saddle Bronc Match took place on a Saturday...and a blustery day at that! Storms moved through the area the night before and morning of, but that didn't dampen the spirits of the organizers or guests. Nearly 1200 people lined up at the gates and came to the arena to claim their spot on the hillsides.

There was pre-rodeo entertainment sponsored by the Theodore Roosevelt Medora Foundation and the intermission entertainment was magician Keith Raymond, sponsored by Spirit Of The West.

35 cowboys from across the United States and Canada were invited to compete in the Match. This year's invitees were a Who's Who of Professional Cowboys including Cody, Jake, Alex and Jesse Wright, Louie Brunson, Wade Sundell, Rhett Fitzpatrick, Cody Taton, J.J. and Cole Elshere, Cody DeMoss, Dustin Hausauer, Jesse Kruse, Ty Atchinson, Will Smith, Josh Reynolds, Isaac Diaz, Jake Costello, and many more. Each cowboy rode one saddle bronc in the long-go.

The twelve highest scorers then went on to the Jim and Tom Tescher short-go round. It was an exciting final round. (The actual rides can be seen on the Home On The Range Facebook page.) Cody Wright drew the outstanding bronc named Tequila Howl owned by Outlaw Buckers from Canada.

Cody Wright scored a high point ride of 93 points. His score gave him the title of Champion. This was Cody's third win at Champions Ride Match. He also won in 2008 and 2006. Tequila Howl was named outstanding

Down On The Farm

Summer is a busy time on the farm. Thanks to West Plains Inc and Dakota Farm for their equipment donations, we were able to cut and bale hay. West Plains donated 250 hours on a tractor and Dakota Farm donated use of a John Deere baler. We made 3500 square bales and 3000 round bales. This year we leased our land out on shares, and we have 1100 bushels of durum in the grain bins.



With the wet and rainy summer, there was ample grass for the cattle. We have approximately 80 head of Gelbvieh cattle. The calves were weaned October 4th. The children now feed the calves, carrying five-gallon buckets of grain to the feed bunks. Once the calves put on some more weight, they will be taken to the local cattle sales ring in Dickinson.

We were blessed with a generous bequest which we weren't expecting. We invested the money into our fleet of vehicles, which we really needed to replace. We were able to purchase a 24-foot Featherlite stock trailer, a ¾ ton crew-cab pickup, a sedan, and an all-wheel drive vehicle.

Having a farm and ranch has many advantages for the kids. The 4-H group raised chickens. The children then learned how to show the chickens in the county fair. These chickens are now laying eggs in their new chicken coop. Three of the students were in the summer school welding class. They worked together to build and weld a bale feeder. It is now in the pasture full of hay for the cattle.

There were many construction projects as our staff took advantage of the nice weather. Many buildings needed windows replaced, shingles replaced, and other basic maintenance. Our biggest accomplishment is completing the animal assisted therapy facility. We are very proud of this facility and even more proud about watching the kids do well in the program.



4-H Club

Once again we had an excellent turnout for our Prairie Plains 4-H Club. There were eleven residents who participated this year and six of them were able to attend the Golden Valley County Fair. Projects that the residents participated in were photography, quilting, poultry, horses and dogs. Ribbons received by those who participated included 6 Grand Champions, 2 Reserve Champions, 22 first place ribbons, 11 second place ribbons and 7 third place ribbons. Two of our residents also received a ten dollar cash award, a picture frame and a medallion. We are all looking forward to next year!

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State Tax Credit for Endowment Gifts

Individuals may receive a state tax credit for a contribution of \$5,000 or more (lump sum or aggregate in one year) to a qualified N.D. endowment. The tax credit is 40% of the charitable deduction allowed by the IRS up to a maximum credit of \$10,000 per year per taxpayer or \$20,000 per year per couple filing jointly. Effective for taxable years starting in 2011.

Businesses (C corporations, S corporations, estates, limited liability companies, trusts and financial institutions) that pay state income tax may receive a 40% credit up to a maximum credit of \$10,000 for contributions to a qualified N.D. endowment. Effective for taxable years starting in 2007, except for financial institutions effective in 2011.

Donations made to Home On The Range Foundation may qualify for the new deduction(s). Please consult your accountant or tax advisor for details and how it would affect your financial status.
