

Home On The Range Named National Charity

Thanks to the efforts of the Fraternal Order of Eagles, and Bill Loffer, the Grand Worthy President (GWP), Home On The Range (HOTR) has been named a national charity. This is the first time in Eagle history that a small charity such as HOTR has been chosen for this honor.

Last June, Bill Loffer made the announcement at the international convention in Orlando, Florida. On August 6 during the Champions Ride Match Rodeo, Bill presented HOTR with a check for \$25,000 to kick off his charitable campaign.

As Grand Worthy President, throughout the year Bill Loffer

travels to clubs across the country. During his visits, he shares stories about HOTR and asks for support of his project. Bill's goal is to raise awareness about HOTR's program and success stories, as well as seek financial support that will perpetuate their programs and services for years to come.

To help raise money for HOTR, Bill created the GWP Dog Tag Club. These unique dog tags proudly display the national Eagles' emblem on the front. On the backside is a special message written by Bill that reads: "Believe in yourself, Believe in good things, Believe in your heart, And you will accomplish

your dreams." All proceeds from the sales of these dog tags will be directed to HOTR.

For 56 years, the Fraternal Order of Eagles and HOTR have shared the same philosophy of serving boys and girls in a way to help them become healthy and productive adults. Bill Loffer learned about HOTR because of his Eagle membership and articles printed in their newsletter. During an Eagle convention in Minot, Bill was introduced to Father William Fahnländer, Director of HOTR at the time. Father Fahnländer was very proud of his home and more than willing to share his story with his new friend Bill.

"Father Fahnländer was so engaging in his effort to please, all the while very proud of his home town and the efforts of HOTR. It was clear to me that his true calling was exactly the life which he was living."

Bill's first visit to HOTR was in the spring of 2004. He and the national board of directors were

of the strong social work team and the current program. He said he's not going to make any changes, just "beef it up a bit." One goal is to expand on the EGALA program (see page 8). Animals, in general, work well in therapy, especially with children, but a horse is more unique. The horse has a keen intellect and can sense people's fears or emotions without judging the person or holding it against him/her. HOTR has a high population of Native Americans. Another one of Don's goals is to incorporate more Native American traditions and cultural diversity programs to all the children.

Of all the goals Don has, it is obvious that his priority is the kids. You will often find Don in the dorms with the boys and girls, or just visiting with them outside. He feels these kids deserve something better, and it is his job to help them find it.

We welcome Don and his wife, Leah, to our HOTR family.



CODY WRIGHT WINS TOP HONORS AT CHAMPIONS RIDE

It was the right kind of day at Home On The Range (HOTR) for the 50th Annual Champions Ride Saddle Bronc Match - beautiful weather, many rodeo legends on hand to reminisce and celebrate, and a talented group of cowboys to ride great bucking horses. It was a day fitting a celebration fifty years in the making.

It was the "right" kind of a day in more ways than one, as Cody Wright of Milford, Utah, spurred his way to the winner's circle. The talented young saddle bronc rider is currently sitting 6th place in the PRCA standings and headed off on a plane to Dodge City to compete in the finals there following his last horse at Champions Ride. Wright was also the \$100,000 winner at this year's Calgary Stampede held in July.

Dickinson's Dusty Hausauer scored the high point ride in the first go with a score of 79.5 points. Rod Hay, currently ranked 8th in the PRCA standings, won the second go round. Hay, from Alberta, Canada, is a three-time Champion of the Match.

The Jim and Tom Tescher Championship Round was won by Cody Horwedel, Parkfield,

California. The crowd came alive when the bronc blew out of the chute and Horwedel rode him with great

style. The crowd liked it. Horwedel liked it. The judges liked it, and scored it 87 points - enough to earn Horwedel the High Point Ride Award and Mullen Hill, the Burch Rodeo Company bronc he rode, won the Best Bronc honors of the Match.

The father/son tie-down roping event was fun to watch as the Tierney family competed against the

Pruitts. The last time Paul Tierney had roped calves in the HOTR arena was in a match against Joe Beaver over twenty years ago! Spectators enjoyed having the tie-down event back at Champions Ride as it had

been in the early years of the Match. Riley Pruitt, a junior-high-aged competitor, and Paul David Tierney, a high school rodeo contestant, certainly showed rodeo fans that they have the stuff champions are made of! The win went to the Tierneys, but it was fun watching for all.

All the activity of the day wasn't focused in the arena, however. The morning started with a Cowboy Reunion Brunch where past World Champions and contestants of the Match, as well as other rodeo enthusiasts, gathered in

air-conditioned comfort to reminisce of Champions Ride events of years gone by. The guest book reads like a who's who of rodeo notables from

Throughout the afternoon, a silent auction of commemorative, hand-made items, signed photos and rodeo collectibles were sold to the highest bidders.

"Little Britches, Big Dreams," the title of the painting, was a big hit. The signed and numbered prints are still available. It is now in the record books. The 50th Annual Champions Ride Saddle Bronc Match is history. And in looking back to the early years and remembering two bronc riding brothers presenting the idea of a saddle bronc riding match to their parish priest in hope of bringing fans from all over to watch and raise money to support HOTR, who could have imagined that 50 years later, the idea is still going strong - bringing people to the Ranch and hope to the children who call it home? That is what has made Champions Ride so important - supporting the ranch home that has spent 56 years making a difference in the lives of the children. It truly was the right cause

in which to invest fifty years of rodeo heroes and the building of a western legacy.

Thank you to everyone who attended, supported, and labored at the 50th Annual Champions Ride

Saddle Bronc Match. We appreciate your efforts in making this day a memorable one for all involved - and especially for helping us to support our mission of healing for youth and families.

Horses Lend a Hoof in Therapy

It's a bit ironic how it is usually the most oppositional child in the group who picks the mule to work with during equine (horse) assisted therapy group. And it is absolutely amazing to see how each child slowly learns how to get the horse, or mule, to follow along with the various activities. Processing what each individual and the



group has learned while working with the horses is the key to equine assisted therapy. Although Home On The Range has always incorporated horses in its programming, we are very pleased that this spring we had

two staff, Bettye Knight and Darrin Nielsen, certified in Equine Assisted Therapy by the Equine Assisted Growth and Learning Association. A master's level licensed



therapist, either Jay Johnson or Laura Feldmann, also assists the certified staff in processing the activities of the group. Bettye Knight and Paula Whitney, residential specialists, are responsible for the Horsemanship classes.

Equine Assisted Therapy has a powerful impact on individuals, families and groups.



Participants learn about themselves and others by participating in activities with the horses. Horses are large and powerful. They create a natural opportunity for the child to overcome fear and develop confidence. Horses are also social animals—they have roles in the herd, moods, personalities and attitudes—just like our kids! Horses provide significant opportunities for metaphorical learning. It's also evident that the horses, and the mule, are enjoying the attention they receive from the children.

EGALA Program

Laura Feldmann has been with HOTR since December of 2005. Laura is a Beach, ND, native but was residing in Bismarck, ND, and working at the Division of Juvenile Services as a Juvenile Corrections Specialist. Laura has a master's of social work degree from the University of Denver. She is married to Loren and they have two children, Tessa, age 3, and Tyra, age 1. Laura commented, "The utilization of horses in therapy, in my opinion, is one of the most underutilized and most valuable modes of therapy. It is very exciting for me to be a part of something this powerful and to have this available to our kids at HOTR."

Bettye Knight has been with HOTR for over six years. She is a Residential Specialist and has worked mainly with the boys since

she started in January of 2000. Bettye was trained in EGALA and is responsible for the Horsemanship classes for all the boys.

Darrin Nielsen has been with HOTR since January of 2001. Working with the EGALA program is very fitting for Darrin due to knowledge of horses and experience with kids. Darrin is a Licensed Social Worker with a bachelor of science degree from Moorhead State University. Darrin states,

"The use of horses as a therapeutic tool is beneficial in that it allows the resident to develop non-threatening relationships." For example, the hook-up exercise is an exercise in which the residents work with a horse to build trust and establish a relationship, which results in the horse following the child around the arena. Darrin is married to Kristie and they have four children, Bobbi Jo, age 13; Logan, age 11; Talon, age 9; and Baili, age 8.



Farm crews made 700 round bales and 5000 square bales. Crews of both boys and girls helped load the bales on the trailer and then unload them into stacks or the barn.

Bernie Keller Receives High Honor

Home On The Range is proud to reprint an article that appeared in the Pierce County Tribune. Bernie Keller was at Home On The Range from August 1950 through May 1953 with three other boys. He was the first HOTR student to graduate from Beach High School. In 1994, Bernie was awarded the first Father Cassidy Alumni Award. The inscription really sums up Bernie's life and contributions. It reads, "Home On The Range presents the Fr. Cassidy Alumni Award to Bernard Keller, Resident August 1950-May 1953, in recognition of personal and professional accomplishments through faith in God, commitment to family and service to Country and Community, June 3, 1994."

During the period July 17-20, 2006, Bernard L. Keller was recognized as an Educator from Pikes Peak Community College, Colorado Springs, Colorado, by the Department of Defense Worldwide Education Symposium in Orlando, Florida. He is credited for Remembering Those Who Have Made a Difference in the United States Military Voluntary Education Program. Although Mr. Keller was not present at the Symposium, he was

cited for his 20-year contribution to members of the Armed Forces.

Mr. Keller served as Coordinator for the Student Work Experience Evaluation Program (SWEEP) for Pikes Peak Community College (PPCC) in Colorado Springs. Throughout Keller's career at PPCC, he was responsible for the management of three external degree programs: Associate of Applied Science in Aviation Maintenance Management, Fire Science and the Associate of General Studies. While he was the SWEEP Administrator, PPCC developed eighty-five Independent Study or seminar courses offered at its home campus and its extended off-campus locations.

Keller received the Medal of Merit from the State of New Mexico Army National Guard for the period May 1985 to March 1993. He was the first civilian residing outside

the state of New Mexico to receive this award.

At the time of his retirement from PPCC on July 1, 1994, over 18,000 students had matriculated through PPCC. The vast majority of these were Army soldiers. Because of SWEEP, PPCC was invited to offer its programs at Fort Sill, OK, and with the Army National Guard, Santa Fe, NM.

Since 1974, Bernie was one of 229 educators featured for making contributions to Military Education. He retired from the Air Force May 1, 1974, as a CMSgt (E-9) with 20 years, 2 months service and from Pikes Peak Community College, July 1, 1994, with 20 years service. Bernie and his wife of 48 years, Rosellie, call home Colorado Springs, Colorado.
