Young Adult Life-Based Classes

Many of the children that come to Home On The Range (HOTR) have been in other placements. Because they have been transferred from placement to placement, the children may not have been attending school on a regular basis, or their academic credits didn't transfer, putting them behind in credits. With the cooperation of the Beach Public School District and the North Dakota Department of Pubic Instruction, HOTR created an on-site, pilot program that provides education. The courses run concurrent with the



school year. We have one class for boys and one class for girls. They each have class twice a week. The Facility Ranch and Plant Director created a syllabus and curriculum with specific topics and goals to be covered every quarter. The work-based learning courses include cattle management, woodworking, welding and vehicle maintenance. In these courses, the children have hands-on practicums, watch educational and safety videos, and may be given homework assignments to complete on weekends. They then take a test or submit a written or oral report, which is graded and turned in to the school district, to keep track of hours of participation and credit(s) earned. The cattle management course teaches children about basic care, feeding, nutrition, reproduction and breeding, calving, record-keeping, cattle marketing, vaccines and disease prevention. There are many on-ranch experiences and practicums, e.g. bottle feeding bum calves, feeding buckets of grain to the cattle or checking the cows during the

calving season. The children are taken on field trips to witness other real-life experiences, such as selling cattle in the public livestock auction stockyards or watching the veterinarian ultra-sound cattle to determine the birth date of a calf.

In the woodworking course, the children learn about hard and soft woods, and build projects such as foot stools or wooden art mosaics. With adult supervision and various electrical tools, they learn how to cut out patterned pieces and sand the wood, and then assemble the parts for the final project. After the recent death of a loved ranch dog, the girls worked with the staff to build a casket for the dog.




The welding course teaches the students the different types of welds on metal or pipe, types of rods to use, how to use a cutting torch, and the correct mix of oxygen and acetylene. The vehicle maintenance



course teaches the children how to check basic fluids of the car, change oil and filters, record keeping and how to change a tire.

The children practice and put to use an array of academic classes, including economics and free markets, chemistry, math, science, reading and computer skills. Throughout each of the courses, the children learn various skills, which will help them throughout their young adult life, and lead them into adulthood. The children practice teamwork, leadership, accountability, responsibility, communication, independence and public

They are earning academic credits to complete the school term, learning life skills to help them be successful, and establishing a foundation for future jobs, careers or college education, in the fields of agriculture, engineering, mechanics, construction or contracting. We had 11 boys and 8 girls complete enough hours to earn a .25 credit in the ag course.
